Polling was conducted online from June 2-8, 2022. Using its Dynamic Online Sampling process and text messaging to attain a sample reflective of the electorate in the 4th Congressional District of Maryland, Change Research polled 586 registered Democrats. All respondents have voted in a recent primary election with a turnout model weighted more to recent gubernatorial primaries than presidential. The margin of error is 4.5 percentage points. Post-stratification weights were made on age, gender, race, education, and zip code to reflect the distribution of potential Democratic primary voters within CD-04.
